Issue 3 Overwhelmingly Passes

Issue 3, a 6.98 mill operating levy, passed overwhelmingly in May. Voters approved the levy 60%-40%, making it the largest margin of victory for an operating levy in Nordonia Schools history.

The levy will allow the district to maintain class sizes and busing, make needed repairs to aging facilities and systems, increase mental health services for students in need, and investigate adding programs to keep Nordonia students competitive with students from area school districts.




Class of 2019 Graduates 319

- Senior Matthew Lastovka was the Nordonia High School recipient of the Phi Beta Kappa Award from the Cleveland Association. Phi Beta Kappa, an academic honorary for college students, is the oldest and most prestigious organization of its kind in the United States. It was founded at the College of William and Mary in December 1776. College students who go beyond the requirements of their classes and demonstrate thoughtful scholarship in the study of liberal arts or science are invited to join Phi Beta Kappa.
- With respect to the Class of 2019, 67 received an Ohio High School Honors
 - Diploma, 115 students were Graduates of Distinction (3.75 GPA) and 54 students were Graduates of Merit (3.35 GPA).

Advanced Placement Exams. The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on students' performance on Advanced Placement Exams. Nordonia High School had 42 Advanced Placement scholars with varying degrees of distinctions.

The Class of 2019 had 40 seniors honored through our Local Scholarship Program, earning \$53,400 in local scholarship award money.



Nordonia Band Continues to Impress

The 2018-19 school year was another successful one for the Nordonia band department. The band competed in OMEA State Finals Competition in November, receiving the highest rating of Superior from all nine judges. This is the sixth consecutive year that they have received a "Superior" rating.

The band played in Bands of America Grand Nationals at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis after qualifying at the Regional level, and competed in Mid-States Finals in Cincinnati after qualifying at the Regional level.

The band won Grand Champion at the Norton "Art in Motion" OMEA competition, finishing first out of eight bands.

During Nordonia's concert season, more than forty students played in 21 performances at the District VI OMEA Solo and Ensemble Competition in January. Seventeen performances were awarded the highest distinction of Superior, while four earned the next highest rating of Excellent.

The Wind Ensemble earned the highest rating of Superior at OMEA District VI Large Group Contest in the top AA class. This is the 5th consecutive year that the Nordonia Wind Ensemble has received a Superior rating.

Nordonia Choirs and Drama Shine

The Nordonia choral and drama programs had a stellar 2018-19 school year, from winning awards to producing albums.

- The Symphonic Chorale produced their first *Renaissance Feaste*.
- Symphonic Chorale & Women's Chorus received Superior Ratings at OMEA State Contest.
- Synergy & Momentum were selected as featured performers at the National A Cappella Festival.
- Synergy headlined the Baldwin Wallace A Cappella Festival.
- Synergy was selected by Disney to open for their National Tour of D'Cappella at Cleveland's Playhouse Square.
- The Nordonia A Cappella Groups (Synergy, Momentum, Knight Rhythm & Genesis) released their first compilation album titled, "Stages" this year.
- The choir took a trip to New York City, learning a dance from a Hamilton cast member and seeing two Broadway shows.
- The Drama Club was nominated for four Dazzle Awards for its production of *The* Wizard of Oz, including Best Musical.
- The fall play, All in the Timing, was a sold-out affair.

Community Investment Yields Great Returns

The Nordonia Hills City School District has one of the lowest tax rates in Summit County. The district continually shows voters that their investment is wise.

- The Class of 2019 earned more than \$8 million in scholarships and completed more than 33,000 hours of community service.
- The Ohio Department of Education has recognized Nordonia as one of the top Value Added districts in the state, meaning our children learn far more than is expected in a year's time.
- Nordonia earned an A in Gap Closing.
 That means students in every one of our subgroups district wide (Asian, Black, Hispanic, Multiracial, White, Economically Disadvantaged, English Learners, and Students with Disabilities) surpassed the achievement goal set by the state.
- All three Nordonia elementary schools have won state or national awards.

Lee Eaton Elementary provides unique experiences for its students. Our 5th graders have the distinct honor of being the first grade level where students from three separate elementary schools merge as one and meet their entire future graduating class while the 6th grade students get to enjoy being our "upper classmen" before heading off to the middle school. Regardless of the students' age or grade level the Lee Eaton Staff is prepared to actively engage students and prepare them academically, socially and emotionally for their future.

Lee Eaton teachers use a variety of teaching strategies to ensure the needs of all students are met, including: Blended Learning, flexible seating and our PAX/PBIS program. Other programs integrated into the curriculum such as D.A.R.E., Be Internet Awesome, Body Wise, Second Step, Too Good for Drugs, Bully Proofing and Exploring Diversity give our students the tools to help navigate the pre-teen years while programs like Adopt-a-Pilot and Career Interests encourages them to think about their future.

Throughout the school year, Lee Eaton students have the opportunity to make new friends and try new things by getting involved with school clubs and after-school programs. Student Council, Peer Mentoring, Future Problem Solvers, Library Club, Band and Choir offer excellent opportunities during the school day for students to engage with their classmates while after-school programs like Young Rembrandts, Youth-to-Youth, Campus Life, Classroom Antics, Girls On the Run, Science Olympiad, Genesis, and our ski club offer even more ways to enjoy Lee Eaton.

Lee Eaton's Family Resource Center



Nordonia 3rd Graders Learn About Diversity

Third grade students worked with Nordonia's diversity consultant, Mrs. Denise Ward, to learn about diversity. Mrs. Ward shared her vision for her work with the students saying, "Diversity activities teach young children to respect and celebrate the differences in all people. Learning about different cultural aspects offers new experiences for children. It also helps them realize that we're all humans, despite differences in how we look or dress, or what we eat or celebrate."

This vision was realized through out her sessions with third graders. Mrs. Ward introduced the concept of diversity and the ways that we are all different using grade level appropriate literature. Students completed an activity to understand the ways they were different and the same.

During her next visit the classes learned about the strengths that can come from differences when we view those differences with respect and understanding. Students participated in group discussions and activities that helped them appreciate how we can value our differences. Mrs. Ward led the classes through some culminating discussions in her final visit of the year, giving students an opportunity to share their learning with their peers.

All six Nordonia schools look forward to an ongoing partnership with Mrs. Ward to continue to cultivate our students' understanding of the value and importance of diversity.



During the 2018-2019 school year, 737 students participated in the Nordonia High School athletic program. These students achieved in both the classroom and well as on the field, court, course, ice, mat and track. Our student-athletes averaged a 3.592 GPA for the school year.

NHS Hosts 3rd Annual Special Olympics

In May, the Nordonia Hills City School District hosted the third annual Summit County Special Olympics Track and Field Day in partnership with Special Olympics Summit County. The Nordonia Track and Field Day provided an extraordinary opportunity for students with intellectual disabilities to showcase their athletic abilities along with their peers from across the county while their families, friends, and community members cheered them on from the stands. Nearly 300 students from 14 school districts participated in track and field events, opening and closing ceremonies, and a variety of recreational activities such as face painting, sensory tables, and photo booth. It was a wonderful day for everyone involved.

NHS Art Club Paints Bench Backs for VFW Traveling Wall

The NHS Art Club worked with the Northfield VFW Post 6768 to paint the backs of 60 benches that were displayed alongside the Vietnam Veteran's Traveling Wall Memorial. It was a great opportunity for students to earn community service credit and participate in something meaningful and important to the Nordonia Hills community and all our veterans.







Nordonia Schools Leaders in **Curriculum and Technology**

- The district provides a variety of interactive technologies for teachers to use to enhance learning in the classroom such as Clever Touch Panels, virtual reality kits, and a HoverCam Pilot.
- The Technology Department worked in conjunction with the high school administration to update the Graphic Design Lab. The lab has been outfitted with the latest Apple devices to prepare our students for real world applica-
- Due to the growth of the 1:1 Chromebook program, the district has been able to decommission several classroom computers instead of replacing the devices. The district's 1:1 program has drastically reduced the amount of printing that takes place, resulting in a significant savings.
- The Technology and Business Departments have worked with Ohio Edison and the State of Ohio on Technology Rebate Program. Our yearly Chromebook refresh cycle allowed the district to receive \$11,846 in a cash rebates for purchasing energy efficient devices.
- The district has been recognized by surrounding northeast Ohio school districts, for the exceptional professional development and technology integration taking place across all of the buildings.
- The district hosted a conference focused on the Power of Personalized Learning. The conference included different sessions to choose from hourly, allowing for high quality, differentiated, professional development.

Rushwood **Named** Rookie School of the Year by LLS

Rushwood was recognized as a Rookie School of the Year for supporting the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, part of a district-wide initiative. Rushwood was the highest raising school this year. Various fundraising events supported the organization, including "stuck for a buck" where school principal, Dr. Jacqueline O'Mara, withstood hundreds of strands of duct tape to a wall; and an evening Glow Run and raffle. In all, Rushwood raised. \$8451.21. A special thank you goes out to Mrs. Goksu Kretch, 4th grade teacher, and Mrs. Wendy Bush, parent, for helping make this event a huge success.

- The district offers sessions for parents to learn about the district's 1:1 Chromebook program, how the students are using the devices in the classroom, and the potential dangers of social media.
- Families engage in an annual Title One Family Literacy Night.



Member Maddy Wells organized the assembly of 200 Easter baskets which were donated to the Emergency Assistance Center for families in need. Maddy worked with Boy Scout Troop #882 and the National Honor Society groups from Twinsburg and Walsh on this collaborative effort.

During the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society Student of the Year Campaign, NHS Officers Hannah Hover and Gina Eterovich raised over \$18,000 in seven weeks for blood cancer research and patient support.

Through the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society Student Series, NHS members Meghan Falkowski and Miah Montesano organized the second annual Glow Run and raised more than \$1,000 for blood cancer research and patient support.

NHS National Honor Society Committed to Service

National Honor Society students are more than smart. They care deeply about the community, and their actions speak louder than words.

- With assistance from Office Depot and Nordonia Building Boosters, the Learning Lounge study space was created in the high school library for NHS members to provide academic and social support for their peers.
- Member Amira Al Amin collected and distributed new socks to area shelters as part of Socktoberfest.
- Members volunteered as elves at the Peninsula Station of the Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad during the annual Polar Express.
- NHS members offered sharpened pencils and Pop Tarts to students as they arrived on midterm exam mornings.
- Members spent an entire day reading to elementary students in all three district elementary schools during Right to Read Week.
- Members donate their study hall and lunch periods to tutor peers at the high school. More 100 sessions were tutored during the 2018-19 school year.
 Members also tutor students at the middle school from 2:45-3:15 p.m. daily.
 More than 100 tutor sessions took place at the middle school as well.
- Twenty NHS members volunteered to run events at the Special Olympics hosted by Nordonia High School.
- NHS members raised \$200 and donated it to Rockin' Frocks to support local students with prom needs.
- Members Malak Abuhashim and Amira Al Amin raised more than \$2,500 in one month to support UNICEF's humanitarian relief efforts in Yemen.
- NHS members raised \$200 and donated it to the organization Caring for Haitian Orphans with AIDS (CHOAIDS). Members and orphans corresponded via video messaging.

Ledgeview Hosts STEAM Night

Ledgeview hosted it first ever Family STEAM Night in February. Families were invited to join our staff members for an evening of activities and events centering around science, technology, engineering, arts and math as they relate to the district's curriculum. A team of teacher volunteers planned the activities to engage families in a hands on learning experience. Families were provided with information regarding the educational value of hands on exploratory learning for students, and a list of resources for additional activities to do at home. Over 100 families attended the event.

4th Graders Perform Around Community

Ledgeview's fourth graders were provided with two new opportunities to share their musical skills out in the community this school year. In December they traveled to Brentwood Health Care Center to sing their Winter Arts Festival program for the residents. Our students and the residents thoroughly enjoyed the experience and we hope to return again this year. In March our students traveled to The Word Church in Akron for an interactive performance with the Akron Symphony Orchestra for the Carnegie Hall's Link Up program entitled *The Orchestra Swings*. They joined with students from 52 other Akron area schools to perform selections on the recorder accompanied by the Akron Symphony.

Readiness Coalition Preps Kids for School

Nordonia continued its partnership with Summit Education Initiative and local preschool programs through its work with the Nordonia Readiness Coalition. In March local businesses and support organizations joined Nordonia kindergarten teachers and our preschool partners to host an information fair for parents with children ages 0-4. Parents had the opportunity to talk to representatives from such organizations as the University of Akron's Center for Literacy, Child Guidance and Family Solutions and Nordonia Hills Preschool Parents to learn more about their programs. In May incoming kindergarten students from Lollipop Cooperative Preschool, The Goddard School of Macedonia, the YMCA had the opportunity to come to Ledgeview during the school day. Students got to take a school bus to Ledgeview, visit a kindergarten classroom, experience a kindergarten lesson and complete an activity with a teacher. The goal of this program was to allow incoming kindergarten students a peek into a kindergarten classroom to help ease their transition to school and create excitement about coming to Nordonia schools.

Ledgeview Library Love

Ledgeview's media specialist, Mrs. Jennifer Schlund, has created many programs at Ledgeview to encourage, excite and support our students' reading growth. Mrs. Schlund started the Literary Character Pumpkin Decorating contest. Students are invited to decorate a pumpkin like their favorite literary character. This has become an annual October event at Ledgeview.

She also started the Star Library Student program to recognize individual student's positive contributions to her class each and every day during the school year. Mrs. Schlund is also responsible for creating, organizing and running our Summer Book Swap. Through this program each Ledgeview student will get to choose between five to eight books at their reading level to support reading over the summer months.

Mrs. Schlund takes donations, purchases books at the library and scholastic sales then, with the help of volunteers and staff members, levels and sorts books for selection. This year Ledgeview gave away thousands of books to our students to read over the summer. In May Mrs. Schlund presented her Young Authors program to Nordonia's Board of Education. This program began when Mrs. Schlund decided to teach students that not only could they learn to be readers but they could become authors too. Three students read their books to the board and were recognized for their accomplishments.



The Nordonia Hills Rotary Club has graciously sponsored a new club at NMS called IN-TERACT. This club is designed to get young people involved in community engagement and to live up to the Rotarian cause of "service before self." The Club created a Veteran's Garden in the front of the school behind the marquee at the flag pole.

- The Nordonia Middle School Science Olympiad team qualified for the state competition at The Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio. The team was led by head coaches Regina Picoult and Tiffany Madden. Relationship Building Core Value of Department

We have been working hard to build relationships with our area businesses, churches and organizations. We have also developed a Health & Wellness Committee to better serve the needs of our students and their families. Here are some exciting accomplishments and projects from this past year:

- The Health & Wellness Committee has partnered with various area organizations to
 offer beneficial services to our students and staff. We are also planning our first 5k
 race and fun run for staff and community.
- We have engaged with local businesses for many art and service-based projects including personalized murals and painting the backs to the VFW benches featured in the Vietnam Veteran Memorial Traveling Wall. We will be working on interactive murals at area businesses this upcoming year.
- We have partnered with the Best Buddies program to foster meaningful relationships and a culture of inclusion between our special needs and regular education students. Nordonia High School will be the first public school in Summit County to adopt a Best Buddies chapter. Students and staff will attend a leadership conference this summer to prepare for launch next year.

Other Business Highlights & Partnerships

- Since the fall of 2015, the district has saved tens of thousands of dollars in utility
 offsets through our partnership with Cenergistic Inc. We continue to reinvest those
 savings back into our buildings, student furniture and innovative learning spaces.
- As part of a statewide program and as a result of our safe workplace culture, we have benefited from over \$30,000 in premium refunds from Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation.
- We are a members of various cost savings consortiums:
 - ⇒ Ohio Schools Council for group purchasing of cafeteria food and supplies, waste recycling, and various utilities.
 - HPS for group purchasing of cafeteria food and supplies, school furniture & equipment.
 - ⇒ Lake Erie Educational Media Consortium for discounts on library resources.
- District participation in federal eRate program provides discounts on telecommunications and internal services. In the past fiscal year, the district received eRate reimbursements totaling over \$38,000.
- Participation in federal grant programs provides additional financial resources for the district. In the past fiscal year, the district received nearly \$900,000. In addition, the district received nearly \$300,000 as a subsidy for the food service program.

Treasurer/CFO Wins Awards

Nordonia Hills City School District Treasurer/CFO Karen Obratil again has won the Auditor of State Award with Distinction. Having won the award multiple times since she began her work in Nordonia in 2012, this year's recognition covers Fiscal Year 2018

The award means that Mrs. Obratil met the following criteria of a "clean" audit report: The audit report does not contain any findings for recovery, material citations, material weaknesses, significant deficiencies, Uniform Guidance (Single Audit) findings or questioned costs. In short, the award means that the Nordonia Schools are good and transparent stewards of our community's tax dollars.

And for the fifth consecutive year, Mrs. Obratil has been awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) for the district's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018.

Nordonia Schools Are Lean Operators

Of the 17 school districts in Summit County, Nordonia has one of the lowest tax rates with one of the highest levels of student achievement.

Nordonia is one of two Summit County school districts without a dedicated permanent improvement levy.

Of 610 school districts in Ohio, 489 school districts have more administrators per student than Nordonia. That means Nordonia is one of the least top-heavy districts in Ohio, ranking in the bottom 20 percent of the state in this category.

The Central Office merging of Superintendent, Human Resources, and Public Relations offices has saved the district more than \$2,400,000 since 2012.

In 2012 Nordonia implemented the Digital Knights online learning program, saving the district an estimated \$825,000 in losses to charter schools.

All Nordonia employees have taken base salary freezes four times in the last nine years.

Pupil Services

The Nordonia Hills City School District provides a continuum of special education services for students ages 3-22. We strive for an integrated learning environment for all students between general education classrooms and special education classrooms. All school staff take responsibility for providing Individualized Education Plans or 504 Accommodation Plans that meets the needs of special needs students, ensuring their access to the general education curriculum.

The District has school counselors available in each of the buildings on a full time basis. These counselors provide academic, social, and emotional support to all students. The Nordonia Hills City School District also provides Clinical Counselors for students who need additional and more long term emotional support.

The District contracts with Akron Children's Hospital to provide health and nursing services. All clinics are staffed with either a Medical Assistant, or an LPN. The district also employs a full time RN to meet the needs of the students across the district.
