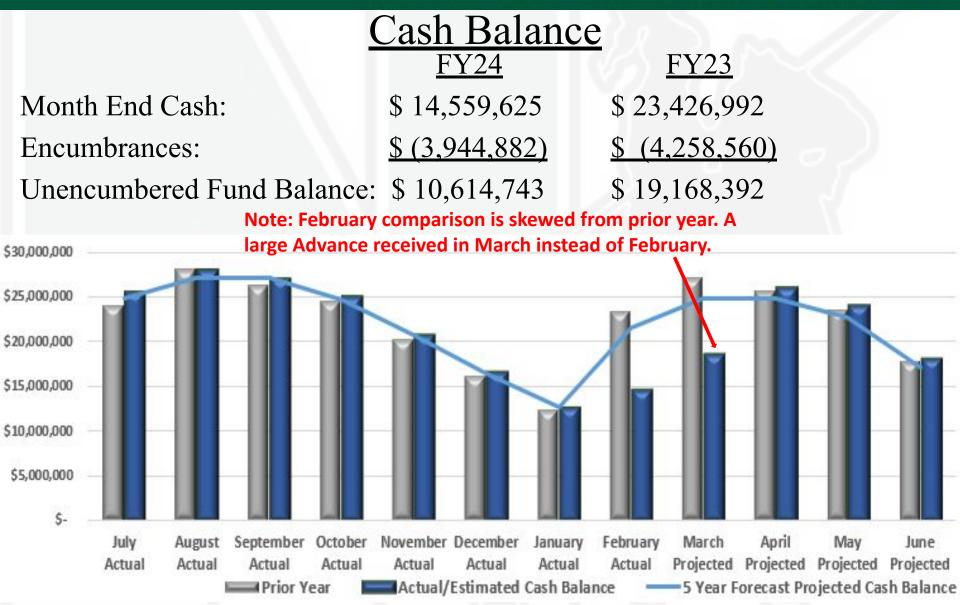

### E-Rate Universal Service Program for Schools and Libraries

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- What is eRate?
  - E-Rate is a federal program designed to make telecommunications and internet services more affordable for schools and libraries.
  - Administered by the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC), E-Rate provides discounts ranging from 20% to 90% on eligible services.
  - Divided in different Categories. Most relevant are Category 1 and Category 2.
  - Category 1 services that provide the basic conduit access to the internet.
  - Category 2 hardware, connection and services that provide internal access to the internet

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### **E-Rate, Nordonia and Networks**

### • Continued:

- Cyber Security is currently NOT eligible for funding with E-Rate possible for future years.
- Nordonia's E-Rate funding is calculated by using enrollment and free and reduced lunch percentage (~15%).
- FY24 funding from the government was \$4.45 billion nationwide. E-Rate is funded annually or until the government halts the program.
- Local Libraries are also eligible for funding.

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### E-Rate, Nordonia and Networks

#### • Why is it important?

- Ohio schools rely on E-Rate to bridge the digital divide and ensure equitable access to technology for all students.
- E-Rate funding helps Ohio schools upgrade their network infrastructure, procure necessary equipment, and access high-speed internet services.
- Core network performance has never been more important in K-12 and is vital to 1:1

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- Who is in charge of E-Rate?
  - In Nordonia E-Rate falls under the Technology Department and Business Department.
  - Nordonia (like many districts) contracts with a consultant to ensure complete accuracy and compliance regulations / requirements.
  - Lack of accuracy can lead to funding denial.
  - The Technology Department will evaluate bids that are submitted and use a matrix to determine who the bid will be awarded to.

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- Why now?
  - Existing core network infrastructure is nearing 10 years old. Normal lifespan is 7-10 years
  - While lifetime warranties exist on our existing equipment, software support has expired for much of our fleet.
  - Replacement inquiries were paused due to the bond issue in November of 2022

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### **E-Rate, Nordonia and Networks**

#### • What is needed? What do we already have?

- New core / edge network switches, new internal fiber lines in 5 of the 6 buildings, configuration services and UPS systems for every network closet.
  - Existing fiber lines were installed in 2001 and must be replaced to support new network hardware. New Infrastructure won't even interface with the old cabling.
  - High School fiber lines were replaced with E-Rate funding in 2020.
- Wireless Access points were replaced with the help of E-Rate funding in Spring / Summer of 2020
- 10GB Internet Connection through NEOnet to every building (Category 1 Funded - upgraded in Spring of 2021)

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### E-Rate, Nordonia and Networks

- How would this be funded? What is the cost?
  - Nordonia's available E-Rate Budget is ~\$568,000
    - A project cost of ~1.42 Million would be needed to use all available funding.
  - Proposed to be funded by Permanent Improvement Dollars.
  - We've estimated the cost of the project to range anywhere from 1,000,00 -1,200,000 for everything needed. Competitive bidding will hopefully lower these estimates.
  - BEAR Method would be used as opposed to SPI method.
    - BEAR (Billed Entity Applicant Reimbursement) the district pays the full amount of the project. Then USAC reimburses the district for the discounted amount of 40%.
      - Can allow for quicker timelines
      - Money is reimbursed within a few weeks of hardware invoicing
    - SPI (Service Provider Invoicing) limits the funding allotted to the project invoice.
      - Can cause delays in project timelines
      - Valuable option for districts that do not have available capital up front.

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- Looking ahead what else is needed?
  - Many of our buildings have outdated network cabling. Bottlenecks could occur in the future.
  - If no new buildings are slated to be built, we will need to invest thousands of dollars into replacing this antiquated cabling with the newest standards. E-Rate funding would also be used going forward so assist with this cost (this is not being done at this time).

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### E-Rate, Nordonia and Networks

#### • Important Considerations:

- Accepting a bid does NOT obligate the district to pay or complete the project.
  - This sets aside the funding dollars available for this funding year
  - Funds are available until September of 2025
    - Extension can be filed.
- Equipment purchased can be moved to a new facility should one be built. E-Rate funding is no longer building specific.
