Your Future Starts Now!

- This is a chance for a fresh start.
- Grades and attendance earned in the 9th grade will impact your cumulative GPA, admission to college, and CVCC admission...more than senior year!
- Students are promoted to the next grade level only if they earn the required number of credits each year.
- Even if promoted, students must still pass required courses for graduation, if not, they are required to repeat the course.

Class Placement

Students are promoted to grade levels based on the number of credits they accumulate per year.

Your Freshman Year is Pivotal!

- Personal Responsibility increases. Teachers are willing to work with you, but not FOR you. Student, teacher, and parent communication is very important.
- Attendance is crucial. You cannot learn if you are not in class participating. It is easier to keep up with the work rather than to catch up to the work.
- Studying and homework completion are imperative to your success!

PROCEDURES FOR COMPLETING SCHEDULING WORKSHEET GRADE 9

- This packet contains all forms that need to be completed and submitted by <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>Feb. 4th</u>.
- Write name and contact number NOW.
- READ DIRECTIONS
- Select courses in ALL areas listed.
- Students sign WS now, parents MUST also sign.
- STUDY HALL-strongly recommended. A few students may need to fill up schedule due to Band + Foreign Language, etc.
- Schedule changes can be made any time BEFORE the first day of school.
- Withdrawing from a course after the year starts= a failure "F"
- Athletes, be sure you pass 5 or more classes that are .5 credit or more. PE(.25 credit) does not apply.

PROCEDURES FOR COMPLETING THE SCHEDULING WORKSHEET GRADE 9

FOR THE 2019-2020 SCHOOL YEAR

- Complete name and telephone information.
- Circle the course numbers and names in each required academic area, as well as elective courses, that you want to register for.

Note: Freshmen must take credits in each of the following academic areas:

- 1 credit English
 1 credit math
 1 credit science
 1 credit social studies
 14 PE 9 & 1/2 credit Health OR1/2 elective course (PE waiver options) & 1/2 credit Health
- 1 study hall (or additional elective)
- Please refer to the Teacher Recommendation Form when making academic course selections ("please read policy on selecting courses you are not recommended for).
- Student and parent must sign the Scheduling Worksheet.
- 5. All students must be registered for at least 6 classes EACH semester.
- Schedules may be changed by contacting the High School Guidance Office <u>before</u> the <u>first day of school</u>. Schedule changes AFTER the start of school <u>are not</u> <u>permitted</u>.


Athletic Eligibility Note: Students must be passing five courses each semester. Physical Education is .25 credit and does not apply toward eligibility. Please be aware of grades in order to remain eligible to participate in athletic programs.

PE Waiver

- A PE waiver can be used to fulfill the PE requirement for graduation (0.5 credits, typically scheduled as PE in 9th grade and PE in 10th grade). No credit is granted however.
- PE Waiver = you must COMPLETE two seasons of a NHS sport, including Color Guard, Band and Cheerleading
- Students must submit the PE Waiver Form upon <u>completion</u> of TWO seasons. "PE Waiver" will then be listed on the student's transcript with no credit.
- You DO NOT have to use a PE Waiver if you are in a sport. You may still choose to take PE if you choose.
- If you DO use the PE Waiver, you will need to make up that 0.5 credit with another 0.5 credit elective course. No credit is given for a PE waiver. It simply means you do not have to take PE in 9th and 10th grade..
- In addition to PE, the Physical Education Department now offers additional electives available to all 9th-12th grade students. However, these additional electives DO NOT replace the requirement of PE class in 9th and 10th grade, a PE Waiver is the only exception to taking PE
 - Recreational Sports and Games
 - Lifetime Fitness
 - Team Sports
 - Basketball

Scheduling Worksheet

- Refer to Teacher Rec. and course book when selecting level of academic courses.
- English CP or Honors
- Math 8th grade course will determine 9th grade course
- Biology CP or Honors
- World History CP, Honors, or AP (Advanced Placement)
- Health (9681) and PE (9600) or a semester of Health (9681) + PE Waiver, then select another 0.5 elective to replace PE9
- 7 periods in our day Use sample
 "schedule" on back to plan courses to ensure you fill at least 6 periods
- Study Hall no course number to write or enter in computer. No more than one period study hall each semester.
- Foreign Language at the high school is rigorous (a 5th academic workload), refer to teacher recommendations



9th Grade Honors/AP Courses

- Honors English 9
- Honors Geometry/Honors Algebra II
- Honors Biology
- Honors World History/AP World History

Grade Weight of Honors/AP Courses

- Cumulative GPA=grade points/credits earned
- Honors courses receive a weight of an additional 0.5 point toward cumulative GPA

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(A=4.5 pts, B=3.5 pts, C=2.5 pts, and D=1.5 pts)
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- AP courses receive a weight of an additional 1.0 point toward cumulative GPA
 (A = 5pts, B = 4 pts, etc.)
- Do not take Honors or AP <u>only</u> because it receives a weight. A grade of "B" in Honors will be awarded 3.5 points toward the GPA, while an "A" in College Prep would be awarded 4 points toward the GPA.
- If you are working towards an Honors Diploma, please be aware that this does not require you to take the Honors level of courses.
- If selecting AP World History course, be sure you have discussed the course with middle school or high school teachers so that you know the college level expectations required.

Student Qualities/Characteristics for Honors/AP Courses

- Willing to accept challenge of enhanced rigor
- Utilizes higher level thinking
- Willing to complete in-depth homework
- Vast interest in subject area
- Possesses strong writing skills
- Strong reading/comprehension skills
- Self-starter
- Willing to spend time outside of school on homework

Recommendation Waiver Form

- If you are taking a course or level that you were not recommended for, you must submit the Recommendation Waiver Form.
- Students will not be scheduled for courses they were not recommended for until the form has been submitted.
- Careful thought has been put into each teacher recommendation.
 Please discuss any concerns or differences with your current middle school teacher to gain valuable information in making course decisions.



Recommendation Waiver Form

If you choose to request a course that was not recommended by the current subject-area teacher, you must complete and submit this Recommendation Waiver Form along with your scheduling materials. The course will not be scheduled until this form has been received. If you have any questions regarding this recommendation, please contact the recommending teacher for more details.

Sign and return only if you choose to enroll in the non-recommended course.

I understand that I have not been recommended for the following course. Dropping this course/transferring to a different level course after the school year begins will result in a "Withdrawal Failure" on my transcript which is calculated as an "F" in my cumulative GPA.

Four Year Plan

- A good course planning tool to use in your yellow Information packet
- The purpose of completing a Four Year Plan for high school is to start thinking about higher level classes or programs that students might want to participate in later.




Naviance Student

- What is Naviance? Naviance Student is a mobile-responsive site that employs intuitive tools that personalize and simplify the college and career planning process.
- 2. What is Naviance Student? Naviance Student makes it easier than ever for you to answer the questions that will shape your future: Who am I? What do I want to be? How will I get there? and How will I succeed? Naviance Student is the student-parent interactive side of Naviance. To simplify things, you will often hear us refer to Naviance Student, simply as Naviance.
- 3. What are the main features of Naviance Student? The Home Page allows you to navigate to the various tools in Naviance and it also is where you can access messages, important updates, resource links, to-do tasks, and your favorites. There are also four tabs in the website that host the main tools: College, Career, About Me and Planner. Additionally, school counselors will send out emails through Naviance to parents and students. This is our main form of communication regarding a variety of topics.
- 4. How do I access Naviance? Students and parents will create separate Naviance accounts at the beginning of the students' 9th grade year. The student username/password is always the same as their log-in used to log on to school computers/chromebooks. Parents must use an email address as their username. Parent accounts give them the opportunity to view their students' accounts, but not access to completing tasks within Naviance. Parents will be able to view what their children are completing in Naviance throughout their high school career. The website to access Naviance is https://student.naviance.com/nordonia (the link can be found on the guidance website, IMC Research Portal, and on your Progress Book homepage).
- What are we supposed to be doing with Naviance? The Nordonia High School Counseling Department meets with each grade level twice a year to work on lessons in Naviance. Below is a list of tools that will be utilized during the counseling lessons conducted each year.
