SUMMIT COUNTY HOMEOWNERS AND LANDLORDS CAN APPLY FOR GRANT MONEY TO REHAB LEAD-BASED PAINT HAZARDS **IN HOMES BUILT BEFORE 1978.**

Lead-based paint hazards are parts of the house covered with lead paint such as windows, doors, porches, wood siding, and other painted parts of the house.

You May Be Able to Get Help from the Program if You Meet ALL the Guidelines:

- Your house was built before 1978 and has lead paint.
- Your house is located in Summit County.
- You have kids under the age of 6 or are expecting a baby; or, you take care of kids under the age of 6 in your home.
- Your income or tenant's income must not be more than the income guidelines.
